## Badger Badges

### INSTRUCTIONS

Please supervise young children as this activity will involve small parts.

### You will need

- some very stiff card (e.g. from a brown corrugated cardboard box)
- some plain white paper (e.g. from a photocopier or a computer printer)
- some round-nosed children's scissors
- water-based children's adhesive (e.g. a Pritt-stick)
- sticky-backed clear film (or wide Sellotape)
- a plastic-coated treasury tag or a length of heavy string with a very big button on the end

### To make the badge

1. Print the following images onto the plain white paper.  
Colour the pictures in if you want to.
2. Carefully cut around the pictures to form a circle. This needs to be about 10mm larger than the final size you want the badge.
3. Now carefully cut the stiff card into circles about 10mm smaller than the white paper circles you've just done.
4. Using a water-based adhesive (such as a Pritt-stick), stick the brown cardboard into the middle of the white paper.
5. Now wipe the adhesive around the edge of the white paper, fold the sticky side backwards and glue it to the back of the badge.  
You should now have a badge, with a badger on the front and a brown disk on the back.
6. If you want to make the badge have a shiny front, then stick a piece of sticky-backed clear film over the front and press it down to remove any air bubbles.
7. Now stick one end of the treasury tag to the brown back of the badge using Sellotape.
8. Finally, thread the other end of the treasury tag through a buttonhole in your shirt or blouse.
